New Video Series: Guides for Foreign Residents of Kanazawa

The Kanazawa City Hall International Exchange Section has created a series of videos introducing useful information for foreign residents of Kanazawa. The information is presented in simple Japanese with subtitles in English and can be found on the Kanazawa City official YouTube account. #1 COVID-19 Vaccine and Booster Shots

This video explains how you can register to receive your vaccine in Kanazawa and the requisite paperwork.

#2 National Health Insurance

This video covers the National Health Insurance system, its benefits, and how to pay your insurance premium.

#3 Required Certificates

This video explains how to request a copy of your Certificate of Residence and Certificate of Earnings.

#4 Child-rearing Support

The first video covers pregnancy through childbirth, including the requisite paperwork and health checkups for both the mother and infant. The second video covers the types of childcare facilities in Kanazawa, the application process, and facility fees.

#5 Natural Disaster

This video covers the emergency warning levels used in Japan and what to do in an emergency.

#6 Multilingual Support

This video covers the multilingual support provided by Kanazawa City Hall for foreign residents, including interpretation services and multilingual guides.
